STUDY OVERVIEW

🔍 Objectives

To understand the changing US consumer landscape during the Covid-19 global pandemic, aytm is conducting a weekly tracker focused on Americans' attitudes and perceptions of the virus, its impact on their daily life, changes in purchase and consumption behavior, and consumers' outlook on the future.

🛅 Methodology

A 7-minute online survey was conducted among N=1000 US adults aware of Covid-19 sampled and weighted to be reflective of the US population.*

This twenty first wave of aytm's Covid-19 Consumer Tracker fielded Thursday, March 4th– Friday, March 5th, 2021 using aytm's survey platform and proprietary panel PaidViewpoint.

*Data was weighted on four key demographics – Age by Gender; Annual Household Income; and four main US Regions.

Reported sample sizes are unweighted sample sizes unless otherwise noted.

All significance testing is conducted at 95% confidence level (Base = 1,000 for Total sample).

Green and *red* text highlighting indicates statistically significant difference over at least one other subgroup.

A Arrows indicates statistically significant change from data point in prior wave, unless noted otherwise.

Chart labels for 4% or less may be omitted for readability.

Covid-19 Wave 24 KEY FINDINGS

- With new vaccines coming available to more Americans throughout February and early March, and with Covid-19 case counts continuing to decline from a peak earlier in the winter, national concern over the Covid-19 pandemic falls near its lowest point since the tracker's beginning.
 - Around half of Americans are concerned to some degree and just one in five are extremely concerned about the pandemic. These rates are on par with the lowest numbers seen in the summer of 2020, and come after the steepest single-month decline in anxiety yet recorded.
 - Despite the easing of acute concern, Americans still place Covid-19 at the top of the list of most-pressing social issues from among several other major societal concerns.
- Impacts on daily life remain consistent and prevalent. One in ten Americans continues to face job loss due to Covid-19 and many more are still coping with reduced wages or earnings. Around three-quarters of Americans report a severe or moderate impact to their daily loves, although the number expecting these impacts to continue through the next 30 days falls to 60 percent.
- From a 30-day outlook perspective, Americans grow sharply more optimistic. Many more Americans are expecting improvements in their local communities, across the country, and globally throughout the next few weeks.
- Intent to get a vaccine is high among 60 percent of those not currently vaccinated, and, similarly, six in 10 Americans are likely to encourage others to get vaccinated as well.
- The expected time until things could return to normal has flattened in March at around 13 months.

With cases dropping significantly across much of the country and as a result of continuing progress in vaccine distribution, pandemic concern falls in March to its lowest point since the summer of 2020. March brings the sharpest single-month decline in concern since the tracker began.

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Anticipated Change in Coronavirus/Covid-19 Situation

Accompanying an overall decline in concern, Americans grow significantly more optimistic about how the pandemic will unfold in their local communities over the next 30 days.

Americans are similarly hopeful about the next 30 days across the country.

The global 30 day outlook improves commensurately, as well.

Employment, Financial Impact of Coronavirus/Covid-19

Coronavirus/Covid-19 Impact on Employment

While Americans are largely feeling lower levels of anxiety related to the pandemic, actual employment effects are virtually unchanged.



Likewise, there is little to no change in how Americans expect their financial state to change within the next year.

Impact On Daily Life

Reported pandemic-related impacts to date are steady, but fewer Americans expect severe/moderate impacts to continue in the coming month.

The time until Americans expect things to "return to normal" remains high at 13.1 months.

Americans are less tied into pandemic-related news in March, and say they've consumed less Covid-19 news overall.

I constantly seek out news on COVID-19 and am always up to date. I check on the news regularly to keep up with the most significant happenings regarding COVID-19. 38% I read/view news about COVID-19 occasionally as I happen to come across it, but don't really seek it out. I actively avoid news about COVID-19 – it's all too much!

Covid-19 continues as the most concerning social issue facing Americans today when compared to other leading challenges. The 45-59 age group remains the most concerned about the pandemic.

Three-quarters of the public report at least moderate impacts to their daily life as a result of Covid-19. Younger Americans are more likely to report significant impacts, as are those in the Northeast.

Job losses related to Covid-19 continue to affect about 1 in 10 Americans, with 19 percent reporting other negative impacts to their regular salary, wages, or hours.

Of those who indicated their employment has been negatively impacted by Covid-19, the majority continue to face those hardships today. Over 60 percent of those who had lost a job remain out of work and just under 80 percent have yet to see their hours or wages return to normal levels.

One quarter of Americans are currently facing worse financial times than they were one year ago, but 40 percent expect to be better off or much better off a year from now. Most Americans continue to expect a mix of good and bad developments for US businesses.

Fewer Americans are expecting severe impacts to their lives as a result of the pandemic over the coming 30 days. Americans do not expect things will be "back to normal" anytime soon, the majority stating in 7-24 months from now.
